ave you looked at the news lately? Are you keeping up with what is happening with your local government? What about the North Carolina General Assembly?

Are you comparing its actions against the Women's Agenda developed this year with input from Women's Agenda Assemblies across North Carolina? How about your Congressperson or our Senators? Are they working for women and family issues that are Important to you?

One of the cornerstones of BPW beginning in 1919 has been advocacy for women and family issues. The first work was on women's suffrage culminating in the 19th Amendment ratified in 1920 providing women the right to vote. There have been many more issues such as equal rights, equal pay, affordable health care, sick leave, child and elderly care. Many of the women who led those fights were BPW members. The work continues even today for women's rights. Are you involved in the advocacy for women's issues?

Now there is a new opportunity to get involved. HERvotes, which was launched on August 25, 2011 in recognition of the anniversary of the 19th Amendment. The purpose of this multi-organization coalition is harnessing the voting power of women in 2012. The goal is to preserve women's Health and Economic Rights in the coming elections.

Women now make up half of the work force and contribute to the economy both as employers, workers and consumers. In the 2008 general election 60.4 percent of women voted compared to 55.7 percent of men, according to the American Center for Women in Politics. That's a positive gender gap; but we can't stop there. Many of those rights which have been won are now in jeopardy. Check out HERvotes website to view a list of the Ten Top Advances at Risk to see which ones interest you most. Personally, I believe all of these are important to women. On top of the list is something that we can all directly affect - voting rights. Many states have already passed and the North Carolina General Assembly is attempting to impose draconian voting ID requirements which will limit the rights of many women to vote. My own mother lives in a state where this is now law. She no longer drives or travels so she doesn't need a photo id – except now she needs one to vote. As many as 32 million American women are in the same situation as my mom. We need all of these women voting to keep the high turnout rates we have achieved.

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
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Women Joining Forces

We're especially grateful that Cathy also uses her talents to give back to the community. This weekend, CAST is raising awareness of two major enemies of women - ovarian and breast cancer. A portion of the proceeds will go toward medical expenses for two women, one with ovarian cancer and the other with breast cancer.
